Election year


The 2024 Legislature - 2nd Session

- Senate: 31(R) 4(D) = 35
 House: 63(R) 7(D) = 70
- One New Senator (Sen. Castleberry resigned)
- One New Representative (Rep. Jess Olson resigned)
- New Record number of Women
 - Senate 8
 - House 22

The Budget(s)

- State Fiscal Year begins July 1st.
- FY 2024 (Half)
 - Adopted by last year's session
 - Started in July
 - Amended (Second Half)
- FY 2025 The "Budget" discussed
 - July 1st, 2024, to June 30th, 2025



Year to Date Revenue

• Revenues less than previous year:

• Sales/Use = \$-19,499,202 (-3.6%) - \$522 million

• Tobacco = \$-1,315,947 (-6.9%) - \$18 million YTD

• 4 Smaller = \$-1,606,804

Year to Date Revenue

• Revenue greater than previous year

- Insurance = \$ +12,939,906 (+37.7%) \$47 million YTD
- CET \$ +10,474,132 (14.3%) \$84 million YTD

• <u>Subtotal \$ + 94,206,644 (11.7%)</u>

 July sales tax from June sales was at 4.5% = one time \$9 million

Budget Conclusions

- FY 2022 (June 30, 2022) = \$97 Million Surplus
- Sales/Use Tax: Reduced Roughly = To Rate Reduction
- FY 2024 Budget Will Have Savings
 - \$50 million reduction regular Medicaid
 - \$50-60 million reduction in Expanded Medicaid
- FY 2024 & FY 2025: Budget Return to Normal
 - Not crisis cutbacks.

Childcare Why is this a business issue?

Workforce Issue

- How many people could join the workforce
- Labor participation rate is high
- Chamber has been involved for two years.

How Chamber Focused on Childcare

Housing Issue

How much income to buy a "market price" home?

- Bad math = \$60,000 (really \$90,000)
- \$30/hr to \$45/hr

How many of those?

- Plenty Jobs: Salary
- Two at \$15/hr to \$20/hr

Unless childcare takes most of one

Creative Ideas - Collaborative

• Businesses Opening Childcare Facilities

- Or providing space and finding an operator liability
- Jointly funding a space with contracted operator

Stipends for Daycare Costs

• Becoming a new benefit like health insurance

• Tri-share

- Costs split between parent, business and state funds
- High Income/Large Business Solutions
 - What about those making \$20/hr & small business

Some of the Issues

- Costs of being Registered
 - Few centers are registered
 - Fewer home providers
- Income Enhancement Programs Require Registration
 - Food payments
 - Low-Income Assistance (Federal money helps only 1,800)
- Preschool
 - 3- & 4-year-olds are profit margin for centers/home care

<u>Actions</u>

- State money increase parent assistance
 - From 209% poverty to a higher level
- State payments to fully fair
 - Move from hourly to enrolled same as private pay
- Child support payments disqualify



Medicaid Expansion - Workforce Issue

- Passed 2022 General election
 - 56% yes to 44% No
- Started July 1st, 2023
- Current Enrollment = 12,623
 - Estimated annual = 30,000
 - Total Medicaid Enrollment = 122,067
- State projection = 47-53,000
 - Cost split = 90% Federal; 10% State

Uniform Commercial Code

Regulates the rules for how money works

Governor Veto


- Central Bank Digital Currencies (CBDC).

<u>Eminent Domain</u> - CO2 Pipelines

- CO2 is lcky
 - Some facilities can sequester on site
 - Not South Dakota
 - Need to transport
- Ethanol markets need
 - Aviation fuel potential
- Minority of landowners trying to stop
- PUC denied Summit to reapply
 - Need to keep laws working



The Initiative/Referendum Process

- Established by a vote of the people in 1898
 - Amendments added by a vote of the people in 1972
- Initiatives: Like any statute passed by the Legislature
 - 5% of total votes cast for Governor
 - 17,508 Due May 7th
- Amendments:
 - 10% votes cast for governor
 - 35,017 Due May 7th



Ballot Measures

- 15 Total filed
- 8 Gathering signatures
 - 7 still in process
- Deadline: May 7th, 2024

- Open Primaries*
- Sales Tax on Food* (2)
- Legislative Term Limits
- Prohibit Amend Ballot Measure
 7 years
- Repeal Medical Marijuana
- Legalizing Rec. Marijuana
